The table now is spread. Our prayer is that you will be richly fed.



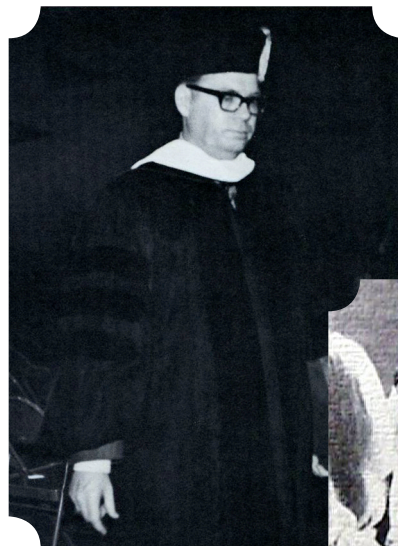
# Shall we go?

Long before computers with endless memory storage, Freed-Hardeman had its own data bank, owned and operated by former president E. Claude Gardner. He knew and could recall, it seemed, every person who had been affiliated with Freed-Hardeman — a valuable resource in his raising funds for the university, I'm sure. He knew who you were, where you came from and where your mama went to church. And, some would say, he also knew your position on brotherhood issues. Even as his body grew weaker, that amazing memory never failed.

Coupled with his knowledge of people, Bro. Gardner had a clear vision of what Freed-Hardeman should be — and a determination not to be underestimated when it came to moving that vision to reality. Consider: he pushed for accreditation by a national agency when the university had no accreditation, he mandated a transition to a senior college when FHC was a small junior college, and he drove us from college to university status by adding graduate programs. Some of us were taken along kicking and screaming, but, as my husband has said, "More often than not, Bro. Gardner was right and we were wrong."

Literally to his dying day, he had plans for the future: plans to write books, plans for sermons he still wanted to preach and ideas (which he shared) for what the university, as well as the community, should do. In chapel, he sometimes used the analogy of pushing a ball up a mountain, saying every day we should push it up a little higher. Forever a forward thinker, he was a true believer in the doctrine of continuous improvement, and Freed-Hardeman, Henderson and Chester County are all the better for it.



Bro. Gardner came as a freshman to Freed-Hardeman College in 1942. N.B. Hardeman was president. In 1949, he joined the faculty, having been hired by Hardeman. With Bro. Gardner's death, possibly the last direct link to the man who was the driving force behind the college for 50 years has been broken. If Bro. Gardner has his way, however, Hardeman will not be forgotten. He always insisted that the school was named for two great men — A.G. Freed and N.B. Hardeman. Calling the school just "Freed," if not heretical, was at least cause for chagrin.

According to his daughter, Phyllis Hester, Bro. Gardner wanted to give something to everyone who came to see him. He subscribed to an unlikely collection of magazines so that when his grandchildren visited, they could leave with a magazine. If he had cooked beans and cornbread

and you visited, you were offered cornbread to take with you. Fittingly, at his funeral, his family provided tracts written by Bro. Gardner on how to become a Christian — so we would have something to take with us. I have my tract, and it will be placed alongside my other treasures.

But, Bro. Gardner, you gave us so much more. You gave yourself to people and causes you believed in: the church, your family, the university and Chester County. Your life-long commitment to continuous improvement is an example for

all of us. Your dedication to the gospel of Christ and your desire to spread the Word challenge us to keep on working toward that goal. By your life, you gave us our marching orders. We shall go.

The **"Local Church Technology: From Start to Finish"** (1:30 p.m., Aud. D) series will challenge those who attend to be more intentional and more prepared to reach and serve the world through technological outreach. In the **"Active Digital Parenting"** series (1:30 p.m., Aud. A), we will explore ways to protect your family and congregation from online threats.
4. Do you want to hear more from FHU faculty or President David Shannon? A special series of lectures will be given by some of the political science faculty at FHU titled **"God's Justice in Human Law"** (9:30 a.m., Aud. A). Other FHU faculty and staff from various departments are also featured on the program. In addition, President Shannon will present the **"State of the University"** address Monday (12:45 p.m., Loyd Aud.) and deliver the Thursday night keynote lesson (7:30 p.m., Loyd Aud.).

We truly believe every session and series in the 2019 Lectureship program will benefit those who attend and/or participate, but we are particularly excited about the new features this year.

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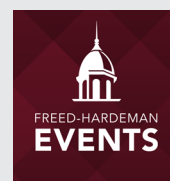

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# ATHLETICS TOP 10

Freed-Hardeman University's athletic teams had plenty to celebrate throughout the 2017-18 season. In addition to success on the field, they also demonstrated success in the classroom. Here are the Top 10 FHU Athletics' moments during the past year.



## WOMEN'S NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

For the first time in school history and following 21 prior attempts, the Freed-Hardeman Lady Lion Basketball Team claimed the national championship. The title came following a 76-64 victory over Westmont (California) College in the NAIA Division 1 Women's Basketball National Championship at the Rimrock Auto Arena in Billings, Montana. Following the championship game, Kim Mallory, senior, was named Tournament Most Valuable Player, and FHU Head Coach Dale Neal was named the 2018 NAIA Coach of the Year. Throughout his 24 years at the helm of the FHU women's basketball team, Neal has led the Lady Lions to 22 straight NAIA national tournament appearances and has compiled a record of 673-176, a winning percentage of .792.

## SOFTBALL WORLD SERIES BERTH

Following an impressive season, which saw the Lady Lion softball team post a 22-2 record in conference play, the Lady Lions took home the AMC regular season title, securing their spot in the NAIA tournament opening round field in Campbellsville, Kentucky. In the NAIA tournament opening round, the Lady Lions split a pair of games in the opening day with a 7-3 victory over No. 13 Lindsey Wilson College and a 1-0 loss to Saint Xavier. Despite falling behind in the bracket, the Lady Lions put together three straight victories on the second day of the tournament to claim their first-ever World Series berth. In the World Series in Clermont, Florida, the Lady Lions picked up an impressive victory over Faulkner University before falling to No. 1 Georgia Gwinnett and No. 8 Southern Oregon University.

## HALL OF FAME

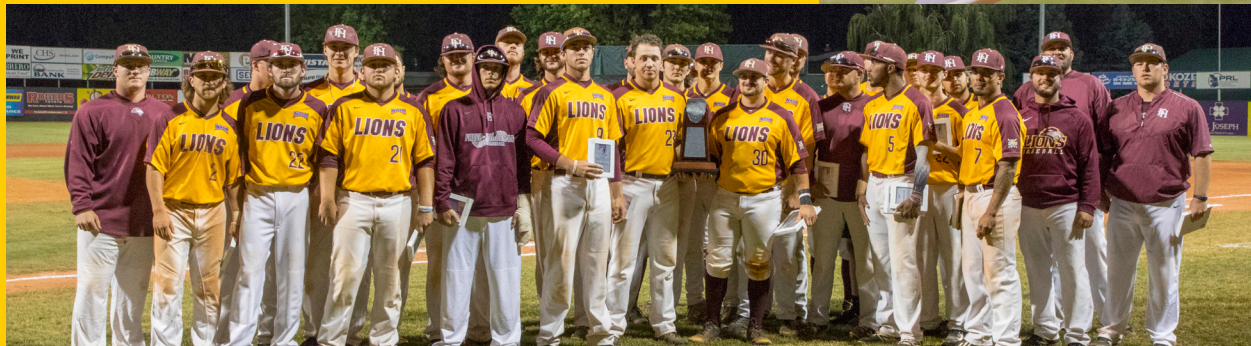
Freed-Hardeman Women's Basketball Coach Dale Neal has had many titles throughout his 24-year career with the Lady Lions, but this past season he added a monumental one. He was named an NAIA Hall of Fame inductee, which is the highest honor presented by the NAIA. Nominees must have outstanding character and leadership ability and be held in high esteem by their colleagues, former coaches and athletes. The NAIA Hall of Fame consists of an athlete and coach category for each sport and a category for general meritorious service.





## WORLD SERIES RUNNER-UP

The FHU Lion Baseball Team proved that it doesn't matter how a team begins a season but how they finish it. They put together one of the best seasons in program history to claim the program's first-ever World Series berth. At one point in the 2018 season, the FHU baseball team stood just above .500 with a record of 10-9. Despite the slow start, the Lions won 37 of their last 44 games to finish the season with a 47-16 record. The Lions only got better as the year went on, as they cruised through the AMC Tournament with three straight wins, followed by a sweep of the NAIA Tournament Opening Round bracket in Upland, Indiana, to advance to the NAIA World Series in Lewiston, Idaho. In the World Series, the Lions notched quality wins over No. 2 Georgia Gwinnett, University of Northwestern Ohio and No. 6 Lewis and Clark State before falling to eventual World Series champion Southeastern (Florida) in the title game.



## CLYMER SETS FHU SEASON RECORDS



In her first season with the FHU Lady Lion Soccer team, Samantha Clymer made her presence known immediately by shattering four FHU single-season records. Clymer, a native of Mayfield, Kentucky, compiled 20 goals throughout the 2017 season, setting the single-season record for most goals in a season. The previous record of 15 goals was set in 2002 by Leslie Tiensvold, who was recently inducted into the FHU Athletics Hall of Fame. Clymer, a transfer from NCAA Division 1 University of Tennessee at Martin, set three other FHU single-season records including Most Points in a Season (42), Most Points per Game (2.33) and Most Goals per Game (1.11). Throughout the 2017-18 season, Clymer led the Lady Lions to an 8-4 record in conference play, which included an eight-game winning streak from Sept. 19 through Oct. 14.

## FHU ATHLETES MAKE THE GRADE

In addition to the countless hours put forth in their respective sports, the athletes at Freed-Hardeman demonstrated equal success in the classroom in 2018. In total, 133 athletes were named to the American Midwest Conference Scholar Athlete team, which requires athletes to maintain a 3.0 GPA. Additionally, 41 athletes were named NAIA Daktronics Scholar Athletes. This honor requires athletes to be at least a junior and achieve a 3.5 or higher cumulative GPA.





## MOORE & BRITT EARN TOP HONORS

FHU golfer Lance Moore and volleyball player Alex Britt received recognition inside and outside the athletic arena in 2017-18. Moore, a senior golfer from Hamilton, Alabama, took home the 2018 Charlie Smith Heart of a Lion Award. The award is given annually to an FHU senior athlete who has demonstrated qualities of courage, determination, hard work, exemplary performance and service to others. Athletes are nominated and voted on by the FHU athletics staff and recognized at the annual Sports Advisory Council Benefit Dinner.

Britt, a senior volleyball player from Lebanon, Tennessee, also received recognition at the end of the 2017-18 academic year, when she was awarded the Faculty Scholarship Leadership medal during the annual commencement exercises at FHU. The faculty has presented the medal annually since 1938 to the student in the graduating class who possesses the highest degree of the following attributes: ability, quality of work, accuracy and love of knowledge and leadership. A cash award made possible by the Alpha Chi Honor Society accompanies the medal.



## TENNESSEE AMATEUR TEAM OF THE YEAR

Following an incredible 2018 season, which saw the Freed-Hardeman Lady Lion Basketball team capture the school's first-ever National Championship, the team was honored at the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame as the Tennessee Amateur Team of the Year. The award was presented to Freed-Hardeman at the annual Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame Induction Banquet held at the Omni Hotel in Nashville, Tennessee, June 16, 2018. Additionally, at the conclusion of the 2018 season, Kim Mallory and Sandra Sylman were both named First-Team All-Americans, while all 14 athletes on the team were named to the Academic All-Conference squad. In order to qualify for the Academic All-Conference team, athletes are required to maintain a 3.0 or higher grade point average.



## GOLF TEAM MILESTONES

The 2017-18 season was another breakout year for the FHU golf teams, as they achieved milestones and earned victories. For the first time in program history, the FHU men's golf team was recognized in the national poll, coming in at No. 22 in the NAIA Golf Coaches poll. Throughout the 2017-18 season, the FHU golf teams combined for an impressive 14 wins and placed 12 golfers on the Academic All-Conference squad, which requires athletes to maintain a 3.0 or higher GPA.



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## CROSS COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIP QUALIFIER



For a second straight year, FHU sophomore cross country runner Tyler Alverson punched his ticket for the NAIA Cross Country National Championship following an impressive finish in the American Midwest Conference Championship Nov. 3, 2017. In the AMC Championship race, Alverson finished third out of 100 runners, with an 8K time of 25:33.

## INKY JOHNSON SPEAKS AT SAC DINNER

Motivational speaker and former University of Tennessee football player Inquoris "Inky" Johnson told FHU's Sports Advisory Council Benefit Dinner audience they should not take their gifts for granted. The dinner and speech in April raised funds for the university's intercollegiate athletic programs.

On Sept. 9, 2006, Johnson suffered an injury that changed his life forever. A routine tackle turned into a life threatening injury, which resulted in a paralyzed right arm, daily pain and constant physical challenges.

As a result of the injury, Johnson's dream of playing professional sports was shattered. During his recovery when asked how he felt, Johnson often replied, "I'm blessed."

He shared much of this positive outlook with his audience, as he said, "We all have adversity in common. Life is not about what happens to us. It's about how we respond to it. When you face life's opposition, adversity or a challenge, never allow life to make you forget why you do what you do. Every single day of your life, do not take what you do for granted."

Johnson completed his master's degree from the University of Tennessee and devotes much of his time to mentoring athletes and underprivileged youth. He and his wife, Allison, reside in Atlanta, Georgia, and have two children, Jada and Inky, Jr.

## WAYNE JACKSON 2019 LECTURESHIP APPRECIATION DINNER

The 2019 FHU Annual Bible Lectureship is dedicated to the life and work of our beloved brother and friend, Wayne Jackson. After serving the East Main congregation in Stockton, California for 55 years, Wayne and Betty have relocated to Jackson, Tennessee, where they are members of the North Jackson congregation. They continue to be outstanding servants of the Lord and His people.

Bro. Wayne is a dynamic preacher, an excellent teacher, a prolific writer, publisher, lecturer and debater. He is the author of 34 books, including "A New Testament Commentary" and "The Prophets: An Old Testament Commentary-Volume IV." The first three volumes of this set are soon to be released, along with an additional book on the New Testament Church.

In a life filled with achievement, perhaps Bro. Wayne's greatest accomplishment is the journal he created in 1965 and continues to serve as editor, the "Christian Courier." In addition to the monthly paper edition, the "Christian Courier Online" version was launched in September 1998, providing thousands of Wayne's articles on biblical subjects to the entire world. In 2018, the website was accessed by 7,035,000 readers from 233 countries and every state in the nation. In the last 10 years, the Courier staff has mailed 50,000 CDs of Wayne's sermons. Truly, his scholarly and godly influence is felt worldwide.

Wayne's life has been immeasurably blessed by his marriage to the former Betty Redden, his beautiful and devoted help meet of 57 years. They are blessed with three children, Joy Jensen, Jared Jackson and Jason Jackson, nine grandchildren (three of whom are enrolled in FHU) and five great-grandchildren.

Wayne is a strong supporter of and contributor to FHU and this lectureship. He appeared on the program annually from 1988 until 2004, when his health prohibited him from making the long winter trip from Stockton. Now that he lives in Jackson and can be with us again, the lectureship committee is highly honored to dedicate the 2019 program to him, a "man of God."

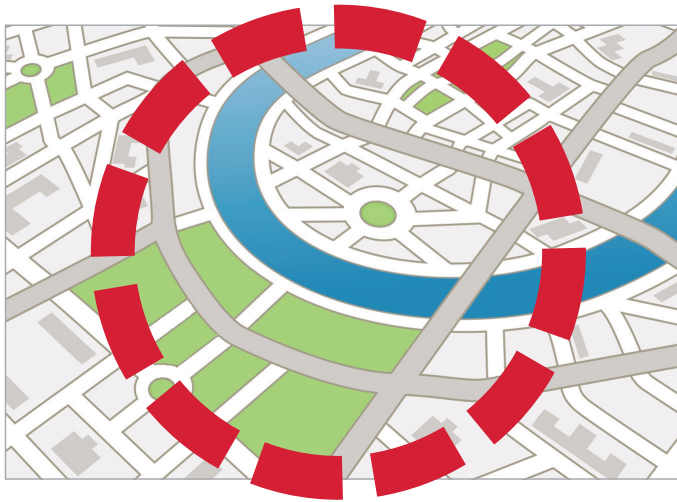
### LADIES' PROGRAM

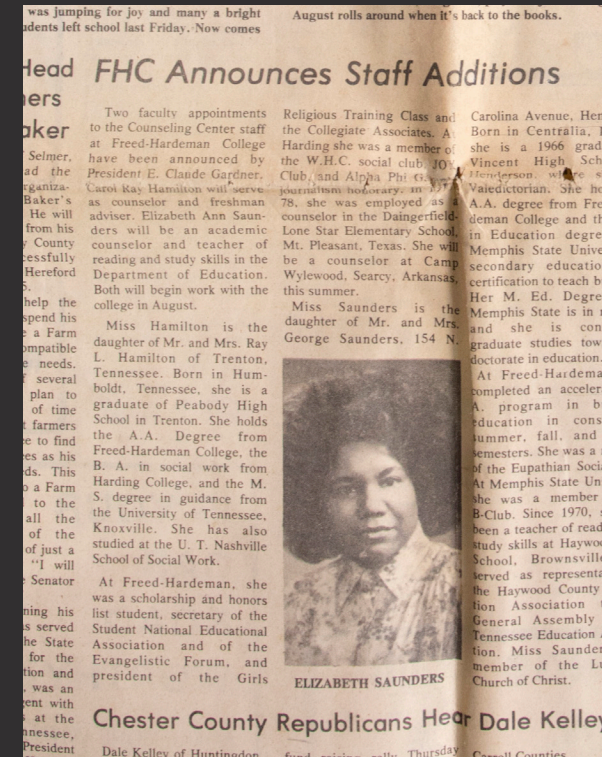

# LEAVING A LEGACY:

## FHU PROFESSOR RETIRES, CONTINUES LEARNING

Stepping out in faith and seeking guidance from the Lord is how Dr. Elizabeth Ann Saunders has made many of the big decisions in her life. When she chose to be one of the first black students to attend Freed-Hardeman in the late 1960s instead of another school where she would not have been in the minority, Saunders prayed about her decision. In 1967 she became Freed-Hardeman's first black graduate. Eleven years later, Saunders sought guidance from the Lord when she was a candidate for a teaching position at her alma mater. She became Freed-Hardeman's first black faculty member in 1978.

"I'm always learning and I'm grateful for all of my experiences," said Saunders, who retired in the spring. She completed her 40th year teaching at FHU in various departments, with the College of Education and Behavioral Sciences comprising a majority of the years. She was one of the first teachers in Graduate Studies in Education. Her brave choices opened the doors of diversity for generations of women and minorities.

A Chester County native, Saunders attended first through 12th grades in the local schools. Her father, George Saunders, was one of her teachers, and he carried her books on their walks to school each day. She grew up knowing the value of education and the importance of literacy.

She taught English and reading five years at Haywood Junior High, taught reading one year at Anderson Grammar School and English and reading two years at Haywood High School. She commuted from Henderson to Brownsville with her mother, who taught at Haywood High School. Her 40 years teaching at Freed-Hardeman brought her many years of professional fulfillment, and she continues teaching two online classes for graduate education students.

Saunders served as the university's Master of the Bell at Freed-Hardeman's Tolling of the Bell ceremony Aug. 22 to commemorate the beginning of the university's 149th academic year. During the ceremony, Saunders told FHU

students, "No one gets a diploma without help."

Several weeks later, she reflected about the many people along the way who supported her, including her maternal grandparents, Elizabeth and Roger Ruth. Several teachers/mentors throughout elementary and secondary school gave Saunders the educational, social and emotional foundation and support she needed. "I remember teachers/mentors like Ms. Pauline Anderson, who let me be her student worker; Mr. Wendell Bloomingburg, who assisted in advising; Coach Hoyt Kirk, who was very welcoming in his class; and others who helped me as a student at FHU."

When Saunders returned to FHU as a faculty member, several administrators and mentors assisted her, including Dr. B. J. Naylor, Dr. J. D. Thomas and the late President E. Claude Gardner. She also referred to her co-worker and friend, Dr. Carol Waymire, and said, "She and I applied for the same position in 1978 at FHC. We were hired as teachers and became best friends. We still remain the best of friends after 40 years. She was instrumental in helping me through the years at FHU."

Since beginning her career helping students improve their literacy skills, Saunders marvels at the ways technology has changed how educators teach. "When I began, I didn't have a computer, and now I'm teaching an online class," Saunders said. "In a traditional classroom, I enjoy the interaction with students; however, in an online class, I'm able to get in more content."

Although she's winding down her time in the classroom, Saunders plans to continue teaching and learning in Wednesday night Bible class and Vacation Bible School, traveling on mission trips and reading her Bible daily. She reads the entire Bible each year.

"I read the Bible as I walk on the treadmill each morning," Saunders said. One of her favorite scriptures is Proverbs 3:5-6: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him, and He will make straight your paths."



To honor her parents, Nyla and George Saunders, and grandparents, Elizabeth and Roger Ruth, Saunders established the Saunders-Ruth Scholarship to assist an FHU undergraduate education major.

George Saunders taught history in Chester County Schools for 37 years and her mother, Nyla, was a cosmetologist who taught those skills in Haywood County for 15 years.

"We can always use additional contributions to the scholarship fund," Saunders said. "I am grateful for the opportunity I've had to teach many students who also have had an impact on my life."

### Saunders receives Tuggle award

The First Annie C. Tuggle Award was presented to Dr. Elizabeth A. Saunders, the director of Development Studies and associate professor of Interdisciplinary Studies and Education of Freed-Hardeman University. The school's Black History Week Committee made the presentation in chapel Monday, Feb. 11.

Saunders is the daughter of Mrs. George Saunders and the late George Saunders. She received her A.A. degree from Freed-Hardeman, her B.S. and M.Ed. degrees from Memphis State, and her Ed.D. degree from East Tennessee State University. She has spent much of her time working on behalf of the North Henderson Church.

Saunders is named the first recipient of the Annie C. Tuggle award, honoring a prominent Christian educator who was a school principal in Millington at 19 years old. A Christian for more than 65 years, Tuggle was dedicated to teaching children.

Community service is a big part of her life. She spends much of her weekends visiting the sick, often taking food she has prepared. She said she makes a conscious effort to be a friend to those who are hurting, sick or otherwise in need.

Some of the many awards she has received are expected and others led by example. "My parents always encouraged me

teaching both undergraduate and graduate courses and supervising student teachers.

"I like working with the student teachers," Saunders said. "It gets me back in the field of elementary and school classroom work. The only thing I don't like about my job is the paperwork."

As if work wasn't enough to keep her busy, Saunders entered the world of politics in 1988 following the death of her father, who was a city board member.

"I was a city board member when he won the election," she said. "He thought about black citizens and their needs."

As the city board member, he was a role model for his daughter. He, like her father, was always ready to serve.

When George Saunders died, his daughter was met with the same support from local citizens that he had experienced seven years earlier.

"After some thought, I decided to accept," Saunders said. "After I accepted, the attitude of service and helping others came to light. I saw that could fulfill that position of service my father. That's why I have continued to run each time."

# UNIVERSITY UPDATES

## NEW FACULTY MEMBERS

Freed-Hardeman University added nine faculty members to its Henderson and Dickson teaching staffs in the Fall 2018 semester.

Dr. Nicole Breeding, Ashley Prentice, Loren Warf, Mark Scott, Martin Johnson and Dr. Shawn Mathis joined the faculty in Henderson. Dr. Amy Downey and Suzanne Gillson will teach in Dickson and Roy Malecha will teach in both Henderson and Dickson.

Breeding teaches in the Department of Behavioral Sciences and is a counselor in the University Counseling Center. Prentice is an assistant professor with the Department of Health and Human Performance. Warf is an English instructor, while Scott is an assistant professor of computer science. Johnson is serving as FHU's missionary-in-residence this year. Mathis is a part-time instructor in behavioral sciences. Downey is an assistant professor of education, Gillson is an assistant professor of nursing, and Malecha is assistant professor of social work.

FHU Provost C.J. Vires lauded the credentials and experience of this year's new faculty. "I fully expect them to be outstanding in the classroom and exceptionally good mentors," he said.

## NEW ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

FHU began offering a Bachelor of Business Administration degree in business analytics in Fall 2018. Developed jointly by the FHU College of Business and the Department of Mathematics and Computer Science, the program requires 39 credit hours of business courses and 24 hours of business analytics and computer science courses. Students will focus their studies on management, analysis and application of data in a business context. Job opportunities after graduation are varied including working as data scientists, logistics managers, financial analysts, data mining analysts, marketing managers and fraud analysts.

## BIBLE LEADERSHIP CHANGES

Dr. Mark Blackwelder began the new academic year as the dean of the College of Biblical Studies and Dr. Doug Burleson began as the assistant dean, succeeding Dr. David Powell who continues as a member of the biblical studies faculty. In addition, Dr. Justin Rogers is the new director of the Graduate School of Theology, a position formerly held by Blackwelder.

The changes were made following Dr. Billy Smith's announcement of his intent to step down from his position as dean of the College of Biblical Studies. He continues to teach at FHU as the Distinguished Professor of Bible.

In addition to their work at FHU, all three men preach on a regular basis. Blackwelder and Burleson share the pulpit at the Estes Church of Christ near Henderson. Rogers preaches for the Broad Street congregation in Lexington, Tennessee.

"I am beyond honored to have been asked to be the dean of the College of Biblical Studies," Blackwelder said. "I am acutely aware of the legacy of faithfulness and service I inherit. It is both a distinct privilege and an awesome responsibility."

## FHU/DICKSON AND FHU/MEMPHIS

The inaugural graduates of Freed-Hardeman/Dickson nursing program recently passed their National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX). The 11 students took their tests earlier this summer and fall and are all employed in the nursing field. The FHU/Dickson nursing program began in August 2016 and administrators are excited about its success. A pinning ceremony and reception were held in the rotunda to celebrate the graduates in May 2018. The overriding goal of the FHU/Dickson nursing program is to produce qualified nurses who are able to function effectively and safely and to do it all at a convenient location at the most cost-effective rate possible. The 21-month, four-semester program is the most recent addition to the Dickson campus and the most successful.



Approved by the Tennessee Board of Nursing and accredited by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education, FHU began offering coursework leading to a Bachelor of Science in Nursing Fall 2016. Students study pharmacology, women's health, adult and advanced adult care, pediatrics, mental health, health assessment, fundamentals of nursing, leadership and several other subjects. They gain clinical experience at Horizon Medical Center and NHC in Dickson and Maury Regional Hospital in Columbia. Several facilities in the Dickson area also provide outpatient clinical experience.

### Former Attorney General Gonzales Speaks

In March 2018, former United States Attorney General Alberto R. Gonzales spoke at the American Values Forum in the Performance Hall of the



Renaissance Center in Dickson. The event raised scholarship funds for students finishing their college degrees at Freed-Hardeman University/Dickson.

Gonzales was appointed by President George W. Bush as the first Hispanic attorney general. He also served as a justice of the Texas Supreme Court and as general counsel

to Bush while he was governor of Texas. Currently, he is the dean and Doyle Rogers Distinguished Professor of the College of Law at Belmont University.

Gonzales described the special experience of working in the White House. "If you are an American citizen and you get to go work every day in the White House, it just does not get any better than that," he said.

### Memphis Alumni

FHU alumni and friends gathered to celebrate the school's impact in Memphis, as they spent an evening at the Memphis zoo. The Memphis Zoo opened the Northwest Passage, home of the polar bears, exclusively for the event. President David Shannon and FHU Memphis Director Aarek Farmer provided attendees with program updates. Highlights from the evening included giveaways of Memphis-branded alumni t-shirts and a drawing for a silver sponsorship to attend the 53rd Annual Benefit Dinner featuring Olympic Gold Medalist Scott Hamilton. One of the zoo's residents also made a surprise appearance during the evening, and a mobile photo booth was on hand to capture the fun.



## RESTORATION OF FHU'S OLD MAIN



Efforts to restore Old Main, Chester County's oldest public building are well underway after reaching its \$5.5 million fundraising goal to bring the building close to its original condition.

Plans call for common spaces such as hallways, lobbies, stairs and Chapel Hall to be restored, while offices, classrooms and restrooms will be updated. Technology will be added and an elevator that will reach all five levels will be installed on the south side of the building. When completed, Old Main will house the Department of Behavioral Sciences and the Department of Communication, Language and Literature.

Built in 1908 by A.G. Freed and N.B. Hardeman to house Southern Teachers' Normal and Business College, Old Main was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 2012. Alliance Corporation of Glasgow, Kentucky, has been contracted to do the work on the building. Plans call for the project to be completed in May 2019, in time for the university's 150th anniversary celebration.

Chester County residents contributed more than \$1 million to the campaign. The local effort was led by Regina East, Kay Tignor and the late Larry Tignor.

## RETIRED POLICE CAPTAIN AS SECURITY DIRECTOR

Stewart S. Brackin became FHU's director of the Office of Safety and Security in early October. Brackin is a retired police captain from Glendale, California, where he served from 1993 until earlier this year.

He holds a B.A. from Pepperdine University and a Peace Officers Standards and Training (P.O.S.T.) certificate. President David Shannon said he is pleased to have Captain Brackin lead FHU's security force. "He brings a wealth of law enforcement experience, and I look forward to hearing his ideas for better serving our students," Shannon said.

The FHU Office of Campus Safety and Security works with local law enforcement 24/7 to monitor campus traffic, suspicious activities on and around campus and severe weather. The campus security staff continuously monitors on-campus activity through security cameras and regular patrols. The FHU community also participates in LionAlert, an electronic early alert system for severe weather as well as any local or campus incident.



## DIRECTOR OF ALUMNI ENGAGEMENT CHRIS RAMEY

FHU alumnus Chris Ramey returned to his alma mater this fall to serve as the director of alumni engagement. With 15 years of professional advancement work in the region, eight of those years were spent as assistant director of alumni relations after graduation, Ramey brings years of expertise in advancement. He has worked in advancement leadership roles for the Exchange Club/Carl Perkins Center for the Prevention of Child Abuse, West Tennessee Healthcare Foundation and, most recently, as Jackson Christian School Director of Advancement.



## DINING SERVICES UNDER UNIVERSITY UMBRELLA

Freed-Hardeman hired Tony and Tamie Torres to bring dining services under the university's umbrella in June 2018.

The couple moved from Middle Tennessee to Henderson, bringing decades of hospitality and customer service experience to university dining. Her diverse background includes operating her own catering business in Lemoore, California and being a banquet manager for the Hutton Hotel in Nashville.

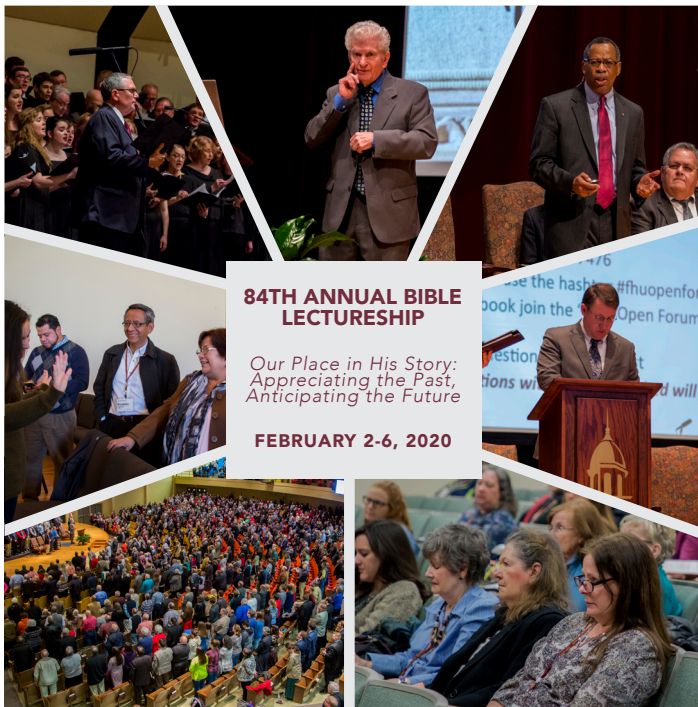

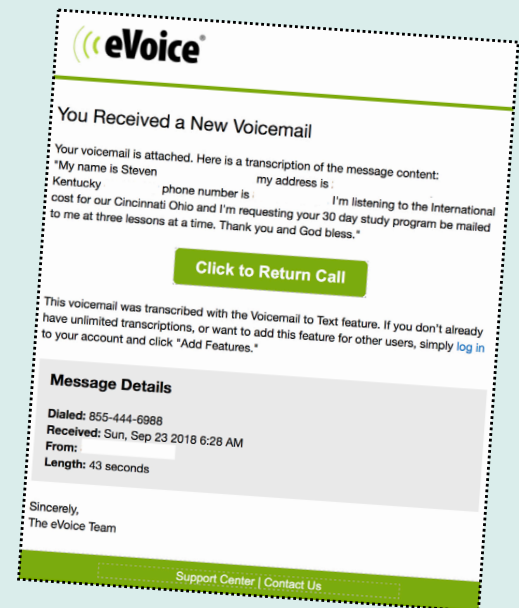

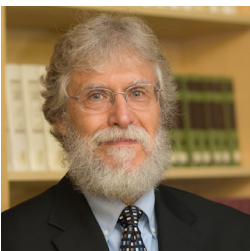
Steven is only one of hundreds who call, email, message or write when they hear International Gospel Hour broadcasts.
