2020 LECTURESHIP FEATURE SESSIONS

Some features of the lectureship are annual favorites, but this year there are several new aspects of the program that we hope will be among your favorites as well.

- Do you enjoy singing? In addition to the congregational singings before keynote sessions, Clayton Chapel Singing on Wednesday night and the Lectureship Chorus rehearsals and performance, each afternoon at 12:30 you can participate in a Song Leading Workshop led by John Wiegand and John R. Hall in Chapel Hall.
- 2. Do you enjoy thinking about the history of the church or studying the American Restoration Movement? In addition to the Friends of the Restoration workshop and luncheon on Monday, "Historic Sermons of the Past" in Chapel Hall each morning at 9:30 will feature unique sermons from A. G. Freed, N. B. Hardeman, T B. Larimore and Marshall Keeble. One new series this year will explore the history and theological foundation of the Restoration Movement (1:30 p.m., Aud. A), while another will explore the question of how you should reflect on this history in a track titled "The Church's Past in Perspective" (8:30 a.m., Aud. C).
- 3. Do you love to preach and hope to go home with some fresh ideas and a few sermons in hand? In the "Four-Day Interactive Sermon Building Workshop" (1:30 p.m., Aud. B) you will find sessions that will send you home with sermons in hand, while a series on "How to Preach Inductively" (9:30 a.m., Aud. C) will offer you an opportunity as a preacher or teacher to reflect on a different way of preparing and presenting lessons from the Word of God.
- 4. Do you want to be encouraged? Three new series this

year are intended to uplift you with good news from the Word of God. The two series titled **"Good News for All Times"** (8:30 and 9:30 a.m., Aud. A) will offer practical and uplifting perspectives from Bible study, while the **"Transformed: Once Lost, Now Found"** (12:30 p.m., Aud. B) will speak to the reality that God can change broken lives.

5. Do you want to be better equipped for Bible study and exegesis? Two series on biblical exegesis will challenge you to better interpret the Old Testament (8:30 a.m., Aud. D) and New Testament (9:30 a.m., Aud. D), while James L. Gardner's series on "The Bible in Translation" (12:30 p.m., Aud. C) will equip you with better tools to understand and evaluate English Bible translations.

We have prayerfully prepared every session and series in the 2020 Lectureship with hopes that God will be glorified and you will grow in faith. We hope you will take advantage of each of these opportunities.

Whether this is your first time to visit campus or you have been attending the lectureship for decades, I trust you will be strengthened in your faith, encouraged in your walk and motivated to take your place in His story.

In addition to the lectures and workshops, dinners and devotionals and food and fellowship that you've come to expect, this year's lectureship committee has planned some special events. In a little homage to FHU's

It is time for people in general, and Christians in particular, to be called back to the reality of God's purposes and to anticipate the future result of what all these reflections will amount to when God stops history.

creating this world (Gen. 1:31), His offering hope in light of humanity's sin by means of His Son (Gen. 3:15; John 3:16), and now, His desiring that all people be saved and come to a knowledge of the truth (1 Tim. 2:4). Yet the Word also reveals that humankind can be a very rebellious and forgetful people (Rom. 3:23; 2 Tim. 4:1). As we study Scripture, we must recognize both the seriousness of humanity's sin and the splendor of the salvation God has offered to humankind. May we remember our place in history, or His story, while also anticipating God's faithful fulfillment of the promises that He has made in His Word.

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SEASONS 50

This issue marks the 50th edition of Seasons. Freed-Hardeman began publishing the magazine in 1993 to better inform its constituency (alumni, students, parents, prospective students, donors and friends) about the progress of the school. The format was a major departure from the newsprint tabloid, FHC Today, which preceded it. Originally it was published three times per year, fall, spring and summer, to coincide with the terms of study.

The frequency of publication has varied during the past 26 years. Currently, the magazine is printed twice a year, with an academic year recap in the summer and a lectureship edition in the winter. Video and digital content at fhu.edu/seasons now supplement the printed copies. Writers, editors and designers, however, still have the same goal that was established decades ago — sharing the university's story in an accurate and engaging manner with FHU family members who are in varying seasons of life.

HARDEMAN HOUSE RESTORATION COMPLETE

Restoration of the Hardeman House, home of long-time Freed-Hardeman President N.B. Hardeman, has been completed. FHU hosted a ribbon cutting and viewing of the house Aug. 21. Frank "Brad" Bradshaw, great-grandson of the Hardemans, spoke at the re-opening of the house.

The two-year, \$500,000 project was funded by members of the Hardeman and Bradshaw families. Extensive repairs have been made to the both the interior and exterior of the house, including new custom windows and Hardy Board siding, along with reconstruction of the front porch. In addition, new wiring and plumbing have been installed. Bead board ceilings have replaced sheet rock and hardwood floors have been refinished. Shaker-styled cabinets and ceramic tile floor have been installed in the kitchen, and the tile is also in the sunroom. A concrete driveway has been poured, and parking has been expanded. Henderson contractor, Tony Rush, supervised the restoration of the house.

N.B. and Joanna Tabler Hardeman built the house at 307 White Avenue in 1915 for their family. Joanna Hardeman had inherited the property from her uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. John McCulley.

Designed by Hubert T. McGee, an alumnus of Freed-Hardeman predecessor Georgie Robertson Christian College and a first cousin of Joanna Tabler Hardeman, the house features a series of twins: twin bay windows, twin staircases and twin fireplaces. When the house was built, it included two bathrooms, although running water was not yet available. That came a year later. The house was the first in Chester County to have electric lights; however, kerosene lamps were still necessary, since the town's power went off at 11 p.m. each day.

Hardeman's granddaughter, Joanne Powers Bradshaw, who spent much of her childhood in the house, remembers it as

grand. "I never considered the exterior beautiful," she wrote, "but to me, it represented strength."

Since the college did not have dormitories, students sometimes lived with the Hardemans. Joanne Bradshaw remembers that at one time 12 students and five members of the Hardeman family lived in the home. Her grandmother, who also taught music at the college, provided meals for the crowd.

The grounds also included a horse barn, hen house, kitchen, rose gardens, three-car garage and riding track. Hardeman was a breeder of champion Tennessee Walking horses and an active board member of the Tennessee Walking Horse Association. The barn, which housed Hardeman's most celebrated horses, Sun's Dark Lady and Maid of Cotton, also received a face-lift.

Freed-Hardeman College purchased the house in 1974 with the help of alumnus Guy N. Woods, who served as moderator of the Annual Bible Lectureship Open Forum for many years. He contributed the proceeds from the sale of "Questions and Answers, Vol. I," which he had compiled and edited from questions asked and answered at the lectureship.

The FHU National Associates have their office in the house, and the house is available for meetings, luncheons, receptions and small weddings. FHU Associates Laurel Sewell, Kay DeLay, Debbie McLaughlin, Tracie Shannon and Ann Tucker served as committee members who were heavily involved with the restoration project.

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

The 2020 FHU Annual Bible Lectureship is dedicated to the life and work of our beloved friends and co-workers in the Kingdom, Ralph and Joyce Gilmore. At the close of the spring semester, Ralph will retire from FHU, where most of his 39 years have been spent as an FHU Distinguished Professor of Bible and Philosophy. The Gilmores will not, however, be retiring from their work throughout the brotherhood, with his full schedule of preaching and teaching, leading mission campaigns, writing, lecturing, and defending the truth in debates and discussions. As always, they will continue serving with both courage and compassion.

Ralph is a native of Mt. Pleasant, Tennessee, and was reared in the Sandy Hook congregation. He enrolled in FHC in the fall of 1968, where he and Joyce Thornton met. Upon completing the A.A. degree (1970) and Third Year Bible Certificate (1971) at FHC, he received his B.A. in Bible and the prestigious Goodpasture Award as the Bible major with the highest GPA at Lipscomb in (1972). He continued his preparation for ministry by earning the M.A. in Christian Apologetics at Harding School of Theology (1975) and the Ph.D. in philosophy from the University of Tennessee (1981).

Ralph is respected and admired on the FHU campus for his scholarship and his genuine love for his students. He has accepted every course, position, committee appointment and

duty assigned to him, providing significant servant leadership. Since 1987, he has served with distinction on the FHU Annual Bible Lectureship Committee, and for more than 20 years has served as moderator of the Open Forum, the second longest tenure in the program's history. He approaches this demanding role with humility.

The Gilmores are blessed with four beautiful daughters, Jenny, Jill, Rachel and Rose; they are doubly blessed with eight (and counting) wonderful grandchildren. The couple is truly a team, fully sharing all the experiences that life brings. Together they have served congregations in Memphis, Martin, Mt. Pleasant, and Knoxville, in addition to the Campbell Street congregation in Jackson for 23 years.

He returned to the states in 1975 to attend Abilene Christian University, where he completed a Bachelor of Arts in Bible and a Master of Arts in New Testament Studies. He returned to Zimbabwe in 1981 to do mission work. While there, he met and married Marjorie McCarthy.

The couple moved to California in 1981 and for several years worked with congregations in California and Texas. The family moved to Henderson, Tennessee,

in 2001, and he taught Bible at FHU and preached at congregations in Finger and Red Walnut. He also completed doctoral studies through Regent University.

"Stan loved students and related to people of all ages so very well," Ryan Fraser, a colleague at FHU, said. "He had a unique way of connecting and drawing others out of their shell."

Mitchell is survived by his wife, Marj; a daughter and son-in-law, Tracy and Chris Watts; two grandchildren, Gideon and Gwen Watts; two sisters, Nancy Wheat (Bobby) and Marcia Redd (Lee); and a brother, William (Karen).

Mitchell was known on campus for his customary benediction as one left his presence. "Go with God," he urged.

ONE, TWO, THREE, ONCE UPON A TIME

One, two, three . . . once upon a time, a showman came to a hamlet in Tennessee with a dream in his head and a love of children in his heart. Henry A. McDaniel, Jr. came to Freed-Hardeman College in 1969 to establish a theatre program. He brought with him an idea he had picked up at Florida State University. He would form a troupe of actors who would entertain children of all ages with songs, poems and stories. They would create magic without the aid of sets or props. With only their imagination and the cooperation of their audience, they would cast a spell on young and old and everyone in between.

That group, Freed-Hardeman University's Pied Pipers, Company II, celebrated its 50th anniversary with a reunion of former Pipers during the 2019 FHU Homecoming. The date also marked a revival of the Pied Pipers at FHU.

For 26 years under "Uncle Hank's" direction, the improvisational theatre troupe delighted audiences. The group celebrated its 25th anniversary in 1993. That was

the last time they met with McDaniel, who died two years later. The group continued for another 15 years under other directors, but went on a 10-year hiatus in 2010.

Dr. Chris Creecy, assistant professor of psychology and one of the reunion coordinators, said he began planning the reunion and found himself reviving an experience that had been significant to him. "This group has meant so much to so many and has been so important to the mission of Freed-Hardeman," he said. "I feel like this is the right time to bring Pied Pipers back to the FHU campus."

Based on comments posted on Facebook, Creecy did not overestimate the impact being a Piper had on participants.

Kell Christie Gary (1986-90), daughter of Hank and Joy McDaniel, grew up with the Pipers. "I have made theatre my constant study and practice," she said, "and just about everything I know I first learned by watching Pipers, and then by being one myself. I learned empathy,

improvisation, connection and how to lay down the building blocks of any story. I learned how to stand where I could be seen, how to make informative pictures onstage, and how to corral large groups of people. I learned how to make theatre with no props, lights, sound, scenery or special costumes. I learned how to land a joke, still an audience and draw even the shyest of audience members out of themselves."


Currently, Gary chairs the fine arts department at Houston High School and is a freelance actor and director. She added, "I also learned that telling a story to a group of people is the deepest of honors and the highest of privileges."

Wendy Czerwonka (1989-93) recalls the 1982-83 troupe as having a major impact on her life. "This is the troupe that made me want to be a Piper. This sealed the deal that I would be attending FHU, and I was in 6th grade," she said. Czerwonka not only became a Piper, she also directed FHU's Pipers and then started four troupes at four different high schools. She called them Companies 8, 9, 10 and 11 based on her estimation of how many there were at the time. Company 1 was at Florida State, where "Uncle Hank" had learned about it.

Gary formed a Troupe at Bolton High School and an inclusive theatre troupe at Houston High School with her advanced acting students and the special needs education department. "It's Pipers in all but name," she said.

Other groups, sometimes with different names, have been formed at other schools, including Harding University, Ohio Valley University, Crowley's Ridge Academy and other places. Although unsure of the exact count, Creecy said, "I think it is safe to say that the arms of the group are far reaching 50 years after its creation at FHU."

Pied Pipers, Company II returned to FHU this fall under the direction of Creecy, a Piper

Boggess and Estes are second generation Pipers. Their mothers, Karen Barlow Boggess and Nicole Iverson Estes, were Pipers in the early 90s.

The 2019-20 edition of the Pipers will continue in the tradition of the former group, but also will add some new stories and songs. In addition to the homecoming show, the troupe will present a chapel program Nov. 21, which would have been McDaniel's 79th birthday. They also plan to participate in Henderson's Christmas parade Dec. 5. They hope to begin performing in schools during the spring semester.

Three, two, one . . . this story's not yet done.



FHU SMASHESENROLLMENTENROLLMENTRECORDSIN 150THYEAR



In its 150th year, Freed-Hardeman University is celebrating more than its history. This fall's numbers show another year of record enrollment, according to FHU President David R. Shannon. Total head count for the Fall 2019 semester stands at a record-breaking 2,117 students, an increase of 100 over last year.

The undergraduate total of 1,648 is also an all-time high, boosted by a 6.5 percent increase in first-time, full-time freshmen. In addition, new partnerships for dual enrollment added 81 students to that program. The fall-to-fall retention rate for first-time freshmen rose to 83 percent, another institutional high. The retention rate for all students was 85 percent. The five-year graduation rate of 63 percent set another institutional record.

FHU traces its history to a school established in 1869 in Henderson. "We are grateful that a century and half later, a record number of students are seeking an excellent Christian education and thriving at FHU," Shannon said. "It's not just the numbers, though; we are excited to support these new FHU family members, as they develop academically, relationally and spiritually. Seeing their academic strength and spiritual character grow as they interact with our highly equipped faculty and staff is inspiring."

Shannon went on to describe the university's current state, as he said, "Where are we at this moment? We stand on FHU's rich, 150-year heritage to reach toward a higher ceiling of future opportunities. While we optimistically believe there has never been a better time to be part of the FHU family, we also know that the best is yet to come." Shannon closed by declaring, "We deeply thank God for blessing us."

Dave Clouse, vice president for community engagement, said, "This year's growth is a testament to the great leadership and team in enrollment management, the cooperation and hard work of the entire campus in serving students, and God's blessing our efforts to nourish the God-given talents of those entrusted to us."

The full-time equivalency enrollment (FTE) of 1,506, an increase of 83 students or 5.5 percent, is an all-time high. The total number of credit hours being taken also reached a new institutional record. Having 1,124 students (39 more than last year) living in the dorm and creating life-long memories and friendships adds to the energy on campus, also.

FHU JUMPS IN U.S. NEWS & WORLD REPORT RANKINGS

Freed-Hardeman University moved up eight spots in the 2020 U.S. News and World Report ranking of colleges and universities, making this the second consecutive year FHU has made major gains in the standings. In the past two years, the university has moved up 15 spots.

FHU is tied for 31st in the Regional Universities—South category of "Best Colleges 2020." Last year, the university tied for 39th place. In addition, it is listed at #10 in Best Value Schools.

The magazine annually rates approximately 1,800 institutions based on the following criteria: outcomes, 35 percent; faculty resources, 20 percent; expert opinion, 20 percent; financial resources, 10 percent; student excellence, 10 percent; and alumni giving, 5 percent. The magazine uses only quantifiable data and last year began considering, in addition to other factors, how successful schools are at enrolling and retaining students who receive Pell Grants.

The Best Value ranking specifically considers a school's academic quality and the 2018-19 cost of attendance for a student who received the average level of need-based financial aid.

"We are pleased to see that FHU has continued to move up in these rankings," FHU President David R. Shannon said. "It is always gratifying when outside agencies recognize the high quality of education our students receive. We remain committed to continuous improvement in the FHU experience and look forward to even better things in the future."

BAND OF BROTHERS

Think Bibles and bikers are an unlikely combination? Not to this gang. For almost 15 years, a group of FHU Bible teachers, along with a few of their friends, have taken extended motorcycle tours.

The Band of Brothers (BoB) consists of charter members Mark Blackwelder and Kippy Myers and former Bible faculty Mark Hooper and David South. Other members are fellow Bible teacher Ralph Gilmore, IT head Greg Maples, former director of FHU campus security Rodney Weaver, and Doug Douthitt, an elder of the church in Joplin, Missouri. Richard Brumback III, also an FHU Bible teacher, is the newest member of the group. Alumnus and former MSYC Director Frank Bradford is among past members, too.

Although he might not agree, Blackwelder seems to be the leader of the pack. "The leader should be the most experienced, knowledgeable and talented of the group," Myers said. "Although he encourages others of us to take the lead, the consensus is that he needs to be our fearless leader, and we appreciate his leadership," Myers explained.

The group typically covers 3,000-4,000 miles over about a 10-day period each summer during what they call their "big trips." Their longest trip extended to 4,500 miles. Their goal is to ride across the United States.

Bible and philosophy professor Ralph Gilmore took his first long ride with the group in 2010. They rode for nine days and covered five states: Tennessee, Missouri, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Colorado and then back home, of course. "I have little idea of what we saw," Gilmore said. "My job was to follow tail lights." He does, however, recall spending the night in Taos where, he said, "The bedbugs were so bad they could have carried the sheets off."

This year's trip circled Lake Michigan, going through Arkansas, Missouri, Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa, Michigan, Indiana, Kentucky and then back home. They also crossed into Canada for a bit. The highlight for newcomer Brumback was stopping in St. Louis for a baseball game and getting to see Albert Pujols return to Busch Stadium for the first time in 10 years. Changing weather was something of an obstacle, however. "We drove through beautiful, sunny days, but also ended up riding in some serious rainstorms. Waterproof boots are very good at holding in water once it gets inside," he said.

"Although I have ridden motorcycles my whole life, I had not been a part of a group ride like this before. There were days we rode well over 500 miles, and that takes a bit of getting used to!" Brumback said.

The BoB chooses each year's destination based on states they haven't visited, which is becoming a harder chore since some members have already ridden all of the continental states. Having chosen a general direction or destination (northeast or Yellowstone, for example), they "look for the twistiest and most scenic roads we can find along the way there and back," Blackwelder said. "Sometimes we just









make a giant loop to no place in particular, just because there are great roads we want to explore."

"Think about it this way," he said. "The roads you might hate to travel in your car because they are full of sharp turns and elevation changes; those are the ones we love the most!"

Although it is hard to choose a favorite, Blackwelder lists the Million Dollar Highway in Colorado and the roads in West Virginia. "The truth is," he said, "as long as we can stay off the interstate and ride on roads that wind through the woods somewhere, we are thrilled."

A trip to Mexico stands out to Myers. "It's probably my favorite because we spent most of our time in my home state of Texas. The hill country has a severe, harsh, sort of beauty to it," he said.

So, how does one become a "brother?" "I think that the bottom line is that a fellow must have a deep love for motorcycling and the patience to put up with multiple weird people for several days in a row," Myers said.

Once in, members need to enjoy eating at BoB headquarters, aka Dairy Queen, and staying in "cheapo" motels, according to Myers. And a couple of other things: "You must be willing to wear BoB t-shirts on a regular basis and refrain from shaving," he added.

As much as they enjoy the scenery and the thrill of the road, Blackwelder said, "The greatest part of it is being together. We get away from work and schedules and deadlines, and just relax. Out on the road we are not defined by our professional roles. We are just men enjoying something that we love, and we come home refreshed and ready to take on whatever challenges we might need to face next."

"Riding with the Band of Brothers has been one of the most fulfilling experiences in my life," Gilmore said.

"There are times when it's almost magical to me," Myers said. "Such as riding all day with a group of guys until the sun is setting. And as we near our homes, one rider after another peels off and waves 'so long for now,' then another peels off, then another, and then you are left alone thinking about a great day of riding with men whom you love and admire, men who are all trying to help each other get to heaven. And thinking back on the day, you can't help but 'enjoy the ride' with a band of Christian brothers." 47

Seven Freed-Hardeman University students sang with the Young Adult Honors Performance Series in August 2019 at the Sydney Opera House in Sydney, Australia.

FHU students have been finalists in the Young Adult Honors Performance Series since the program began in 2016. An eighth student, Summer England, was named a finalist as well, but was unable to travel. The FHU students were seven of 70 finalists selected from more than 14,000 auditions submitted from around the world. FHU students spent six days in Sydney working with renowned conductors and musicians to prepare for the performance.

"It's an odd thing, stepping onto a plane on a Monday and then stepping off at your destination on a Wednesday. For us, the Sydney singers, Tuesday, July 30, is the day that ceased to exist all while being chased by the sun into the southern hemisphere to a land down under, Australia!" Jacob Moseley, a 2019 FHU graduate, said.

While in Sydney, performers took a day trip to the Blue Mountains and a Finalist Celebration Cruise on Sydney Harbour. Singers worked with Dr. Jeffrey Redding, director of choral activities at West Orange High School in Winter





Garden, Florida. As a conductor and clinician, Redding has led choirs in performances at state, regional, and national conventions of the American Choral Directors' Association (ACDA). For the Young Adult Honors Performance Series, Redding selected several songs including "Ave Maria" and "Hallelujah from the Mount of Olives" and "Berusa Er" ("Drink Abundantly").

Gary McKnight, FHU associate professor of music and director of University Chorale, said watching the student singers perform was an emotional experience.

"Listening and watching them made me realize our students are learning and growing to the point that they're being recognized amongst the best and on an international stage," McKnight said. "Their performance gave me a lot of joy. It's been very satisfying to see them develop, enjoy what they do and excel."

Performing at the Sydney Opera House was FHU graduate student Parker Pearce's third time on a world-renowned stage. "I have performed twice at Carnegie Hall through this same program in 2017, and in 2018 I was actually selected to be a soloist," Pearce said. "I didn't plan on auditioning a third time, but when I heard the program would be in Sydney, I couldn't help myself."

Historically, FHU finance majors have proven themselves to be well-prepared. They have consistently scored at the 98-99th percentile on the Major Field Test in finance.

FHU students can now earn a Bachelor of Business Administration in a finance program specifically designed for those who desire a career in financial planning. FHU's College of Business is a CFP Board educational partner and this program has been approved as a CFP Board Registered Program. Students who complete it are immediately eligible to sit for the CFP® Certification Exam.

BIBLE PROFESSOR JOINS INTERNATIONAL PHILO BIBLIOGRAPHY PROJECT

Dr. Justin Rogers, Freed-Hardeman University associate professor of Bible and director of the FHU Graduate School of Theology, has accepted an invitation to join the International Philo Bibliography Project, under the direction of David T. Runia of Melbourne, Australia.

Ten scholars from around the world (Australia, Italy, Germany, the Netherlands, the United Kingdom, Norway, and the United States) work each year to compile a comprehensive bibliography with brief reviews of every work published in areas related to Philonic studies. The bibliography and reviews are published each year in the "Studia Philonica Annual," and every 10 years are published as a monograph with Brill, an international scholarly publisher. Rogers' area of emphasis will be Hellenistic Judaism and the New Testament.

In addition, Rogers has been selected to serve as the program unit chair for the Philo of Alexandria Seminar of the Society of Biblical Literature.

Philo of Alexandria, a younger contemporary of the apostle Paul, is the most important representative of Judaism in the Greek-speaking Diaspora. His writings offer key insights into Jewish understandings of the Bible at the time of the New Testament.



NUTRITION CLASS PROJECT FEEDS THE HUNGRY

For 15 Freed-Hardeman University students, their principles of nutrition class led to more than taking notes and passing a test. This group of students used the knowledge they gained to feed the hungry in a project dubbed "Five Loaves and Two Fish."

Students identified a population at risk of malnutrition. After completing a review of relevant literature, they noted various factors for malnutrition. Students, however, did not stop with gaining knowledge. They put that knowledge to work by planning, purchasing and distributing a nonperishable, balanced meal based on nutritional guidelines for the selected population.

Students then developed an insert that included a Bible verse and recommended dietary guidelines for the recipients of the meals. Students delivered 230 meals and messages in a reusable container to groups in the community. Each meal cost of \$4.15, including the container. The class project was made possible through FHU's Engaged Learning Initiative.

Dr. Raven Wentworth, assistant professor of nursing who taught the class, made a poster presentation about the project at the joint conference of Tennessee Nurses Association and Tennessee Student Nurses Association Oct.18-19, 2019, in Memphis. The poster also has been accepted for presentation at the Memphis Nurse Educator Institute in March 2020.



FHU BUSINESS PROFESSOR TO DIRECT ACCOUNTING EDUCATOR SOCIETY

Dr. Brandon Lanciloti, assistant professor of accounting at Freed-Hardeman University, has been named 2019-20 director and program chair of the Tennessee Society of Accounting Educators (TSAE). His responsibilities include creating the program and selecting speakers for the 2020 conference.

TSAE aims to assist with the development of higher quality accounting programs in Tennessee by promoting excellence in the classroom. It promotes the development of accounting as both a theoretical and applied discipline, provides for the professional interests of its members, and offers a forum for interaction between accounting educators from Tennessee's four-year universities, twoyear colleges, state technical institutes, and private colleges and universities.

"I have always enjoyed attending these conferences and am looking forward to shaping the agenda for next year's conference," Lanciloti said. "We typically have nationally-recognized or award-winning accounting educators as keynote speakers and the conference always yields information that I can use to improve my teaching."

BIBLE PROFESSOR PRESENTS RESEARCH AT OXFORD UNIVERSITY

Dr. Richard Brumback III, Freed-Hardeman University Bible professor and a narrator of Bible Land Passages, a documentary series, recently presented a paper of original research at the 18th International Conference on Patristics Studies at Oxford University.

The conference, which focused upon early church history, involved 1,100 church history professors and graduate students from around the world, the largest such gathering in the discipline. Brumback's presentation, titled "Gregory of Elvira and the Evolution of a Spanish Pro-Nicene," examined the work of this bishop who lived in the mid-fourth century and was involved in early debates about the deity of Christ.

"The Oxford conference allowed me the opportunity to meet with the North American Patristics Society (NAPS) board members, especially as we plan our own annual conference to be held in May 2020," Brumback said. He serves as the secretary and treasurer of NAPS.

The Bible Land Passages series highlights key persons and events in the Old Testament and during the lifetime of Christ. Filmed on location in Israel, these documentaries are meant to help viewers understand the selected biblical events and understand their significance for today. The latest release is Brumback's work on "The Tomb of Jesus," which looks at possible locations for the burial site of Christ. Twelve episodes have been completed with an anticipated final collection of 25.

Brumback spent six weeks in Israel during the summer of 2018 attaining his own photographs and videos of biblical sites, and learning more about the country and its history. Brumback incorporates the images and videos into his classroom instruction at FHU. Some of these materials are also utilized in episodes of Bible Land Passages which may be found at biblelandpassages.org.
